Sustainability Leaders program for Banyule and Darebin

This free Community Leaders in Sustainability course offered by both Banyule and Darebin Councils may be for you or someone you know.

HELP YOUR STREET TREE SURVIVE THE SUMMER HEAT

A few months ago, I was delighted to see a new tree appear on my nature strip, in response to my request to the Council. It is a sturdy hakea laurina, a species which is well adapted to the exposed conditions and the hard clay ground.

But to ensure that this hakea survives and grows, the Council has asked me to help care for it.

It would be wonderful if all residents could do the same over the hot dry summer weeks ahead. So what is needed to keep your tree alive?

- Give your tree 2 or 3 buckets of water twice a week during the summer. This is especially important when they are young, but even mature trees will benefit.

 BUT
- <u>Do not</u> remove the mulch from around new trees. This material helps retain moisture and keep the weeds down.
- <u>Do not</u> pile grass clippings around the trunk as this encourages collar rot.
- <u>Do not</u> use poisons or herbicides near the tree, as this can cause the death of young trees



• <u>Do not</u> park your car or leave heavy items under the tree- this will compact the soil and damage the roots

That's all!



The Adani Bad News

You may have heard that Adani has halved the size of their mine and can now finance it themselves. They said they planned to start work before Christmas, but nothing has happened. While disappointing, it is not the end. Adani has said many times they would be starting work, but never have. The revised plans mean they must reach agreement with Aurizon to use the existing rail line. This may be harder than Adani thinks.

It is also encouraging that CSIRO has come out and said that the mine threatens critical natural springs in Qld.

A strike by Australian School students calling on the government to take action has made international news. There were rallies all over Australia with more than 15,000 students taking part.

I was at the Melbourne march (probably the biggest) and it was inspiring.

14 yo Jean was on The Project last night here and it is so good!

The idea grew from Greta Thunberg, a 15-year-old student in Sweden. She went on strike every Friday outside the Sweedish parliament.

Her stand attracted world wide media attention and she has now toured Europe encouraging students to take a stand against climate change.

Her actions inspired 3 girls from Castlemaine to do the same.

It has also attracted the attention of our prime minister who suggested that they have got Climate Change under control and the students would be better spending their time studying at school.

Unsurprisingly this attracted a lot of condemnation, with Jagveer Singh saying "If the politicians were doing their job, they wouldn't need to go on strike."

Banyule Council's Climate Urgency Report

The Banyule Council has just completed a review of its Climate Action performance. This involved Climate Action Forum in September where groups provided input.

The most recent Council meeting of 10 December tabled the following report after engaging with us as community stakeholders. The additional notes show there is room now for us all to work together to make Banyule a leading contributor to restoring a safe climate.

While it was disappointing that council rejected suggestions to spend 6 months investigating the need to declare a Climate Emergency, they did agree the following.

That Council:

- Recognises that urgent action is required across all three levels of government to tackle climate change and that within this context Banyule City Council is taking a strong leadership role on behalf of our local community.
- Notes that Banyule City Council is unable to achieve its target of carbon neutrality by 2020 without purchasing offsets at a cost of \$250k to \$300k per annum and that Council does not wish to purchase offsets to achieve carbon neutrality at this stage.
- Establishes a target to achieve carbon neutrality by 2028 without the purchase of carbon offsets. The Council Executive is asked to establish a pathway to carbon neutrality including interim targets.
- Endorses the following Climate Change Action Package to position Council to achieve carbon neutrality by 2028:
- Continue to deliver current carbon abatement initiatives and broad range of community environmental programs that are consistent with the Council Plan 2017-21 and associated environmental strategies. This includes \$1.30m in solar PV across Council buildings and facilities in the 2017/18 and 2018/19 budgets.
 - Consider an additional \$5.0m budget over the next three years comprising:
 - * \$1.95m for additional solar PV across 150 Council owned buildings and facilities.
 - * \$1.20m for energy efficiency enhancements (i.e. double glazing, insulation, etc.) across Council owned buildings.
 - \$600,000 for fleet efficiency (i.e. electric vehicles and bikes)
 - * \$600,000 to create 10 'Green Collar' internships for the next three years in partnership with other agencies.
 - Up to \$200,000 for a business case(s) on long-term abatement initiatives (i.e. a solar farm, wind farm, energy retailing, PPAs, street lights on major roads).
 - * \$100,000 to increase the environmental grants by \$50,000 p.a. over the next two years. The increase in

grants will support local community organisations with education and engagement initiatives. The Council Executive is asked to consider the structure of the grants process to ensure the process is flexible and nimble, in line with community needs, and is also aligned with Council's environmental strategic objectives.

- * \$75,000 for a Climate Change Mitigation Strategy using the C40 framework (International climate action planning framework for cities) as set-out below.
- Receive, consider and include long term carbon abatement actions and pathways available to Council through a C40 analysis to be delivered in early 2019. Council will also use the C40 framework to guide its governance and delivery of environmental initiatives going forward, as well as to investigate and implement best practice initiatives for helping the community to reach carbon neutrality.
- Receive the three draft strategic plans for the areas of Water, Stewardship and Biodiversity and endorses their release for publication. These strategies sit within the C40 framework and form a part of Council's overarching environmental strategic framework.
- Authorises the CEO to seek carbon neutral certification of Council operations with the Australian Government Department of the Environment and Energy against the National Carbon Offset Standard (NCOS). This will independently establish Council's baseline level of carbon emissions.
- Receives an annual delivery implementation update on the anniversary of the adoption of this report on progress to achieving carbon neutrality by 2028.
- Identify Councils emissions profiles dating back to 1997 alongside key events that have impacted our emission profile.
- Thanks all participants in the Climate Forum held on 21 September 2018 and notifies them of the outcomes of this report. Council commits to continue to proactively engage with the community on ideas and opportunities to drive climate change action going forward as well as to investigate and implement best practice initiatives for helping the community to reduce carbon emissions.
- Publishes the Climate Change Action Package, current abatement initiatives and all related plans and strategies on the Banyule City Council Climate Change Action web page. The web page is to include data and information on Council's environmental targets and KPIs. The community is to be engaged in the design of the web page to ensure it meets community needs.
