Profile—Joanne Rockwell—Boots For All

10 years ago, Joanne Rockwell was working at Museum Victoria, when she met some women visiting from NT. They needed football boots for their children and grandchildren, so they could play in a grand final match in Darwin. Joanne searched for a sports recycling charity, but none existed in Melbourne at that time. So Joanne and 3 others were motivated to start their own. Joanne was associated with a local football club that had 650 junior players- a wonderful opportunity to obtain a supply of football boots when they were no longer wanted. So the team of 4 co-founded an organisation in Eltham to collect reusable items and re-distribute them to vulnerable people unable to access sporting activities through a lack of the necessary clothes and equipment.

Boots for All began operating with support from the NAB and ANZ, and when Eltham Rotary paid volunteers' insurance, they were able to take on teams of volunteers and expand. After operating for 7 ½ years without a venue, they are now in the Storage King building in Briar Hill. It now has 5 employees. Joanne is the CEO.

Joanne is impressed by the sheer number of good quality sports goods that are in the community, but not being used. Children grow out of their shoes and tops, people give up a



game but their equipment is still good and shoe shops have unwanted stock. Boots for All have already received so many donations that they have been able to redirect 40,000 items across Australia.

But there is another important aspect to this recycling process. Shoes that are unfit for re-use are sent to a factory in Campbellfield, where the materials are processed and used in the manufacture of indoor and outdoor playing surfaces.

As well as supplying disadvantaged sports clubs, Boots for All now sell items to the general public from their retail shop to raise funds for their training programmes for employees. The Boots For All retail shop is at 24 Sherbourne Road, Briar Hill.


Recent News from MASSG



Trees on Monty's Nature Strips

Does the nature strip in front of your house have a tree?

If not, this may be because the original tree or shrub has been removed. In my street, so many of the original street trees have gone, that only about 20% of houses have a tree out the front.

Over recent years, Monty's street trees have sufferred attacks from many sources, causing much damage and the death of many of these valuable trees. Monty's street trees have had to contend with difficult growing conditions with frequent droughts and barren rocky ground, and with damage from pests and diseases and the destructive effects of storms and high winds. But many others have been lost or damaged as a result of neglect or abuse. There have been many cases of-damage by passing trucks, illegal removal, damage or removal during nearby construction works, branches broken by vandals and long term root damage from parked vehicles and heavy items being stored next to the tree trunks.

It is not surprising that our street trees are declining! Even the toughest species are finding it hard to thrive. The loss of street trees means few shady spots to park your car in summer. Without this shade, I don't enjoy walking along sunbaked streets on summer days. Street trees play a big part in moderating the extremes of summer heat and winter cold. They even add monetary value to your property! Not to mention the addition of beauty to the landscape and habitat for local wildlife.

But the good news is that residents can easily arrange for a replacement tree to be planted in their nature strip. You can send a request to the



Parks Department at the Council. You can ring the Council on 9490 4222 or lodge your request through their website.

The policy of the Council is to replace damaged trees, trees that have been removed, or in places where trees were previously not planted and to respond to requests for trees by residents. "Follow-up watering occurs in the warmer months but we rely on additional watering by the community and encourage people to nurture the tree on their nature strip. Every effort is made to select the most appropriate species for a particular street-scape."

If we want to see our treed streetscapes survive into the future, residents can play a big part to ensure this happens.
